For those in immigration detention and for those who live in fear now because of recent threats of mass deportations.



## **Report from Special Meeting of January 26**

The special meeting of the English Worshiping Community was attended by 32 people in-person and 9 people online. They unanimously approved an additional week of study leave for Rev. Donald P. Hammond so he can attend the Art of Transitional Ministry. Also approved was a budget increase of \$500 for his associated reimbursable expenses.

Results of the August 2024 Ministry Satisfaction Survey were shared. Overall, all 28 responses to the survey were satisfied.

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February 19, 2025, marks 83 years since the signing of Executive Order 9066, which authorized the mass incarceration of 120,000 individuals of Japanese ancestry—about one-third of whom were children. We must ensure that such injustice is never repeated. The time to act is now. We must stop the cruelty of raids, roundups, and the expansion of the detention system—and dismantle the detention system itself. Take action. Attend a Day or Remembrance event in your community to honor this legacy—the resilience and resistance of our ancestors. Invite your family, friends and neighbors. Stand united to shine a light on justice. Together, we can ensure that history does not repeat itself and that the rights of all are fiercely defended. For our sake and the sake of future generations.
